Agtech Grant Program Guidelines



Farms of the Future

Background

The Farms of the Future (FoTF) Program will deliver improved connectivity and encourage farmers to adopt Agtech to boost productivity and improve resource management, including water efficiency and drought preparedness. The project is committed to working with regional communities, farmers and industries, enabling them to become more self-reliant and better prepared for the impacts of future drought events and other economic shocks.

The Farms of the Future program is being delivered and administered by the Primary Industries Group (DPI) within the Department of Regional NSW (the Department).

Assistance available

Eligible applicants can apply for funding of 70% of the cost of eligible purchases of Approved Agtech (which includes Ag IoT devices, connectivity solutions and device data integration dashboards), up to a maximum of \$35,000 (excluding GST) per eligible applicant.

Grant contributions for the connectivity solutions is subject to a specific cap of \$15,000, within the overall program cap of \$35,000.

Grant applications must be for a minimum of \$5,000. The subscription costs for apps and devices, up until the end of the program, 30 June 2025 can be included in the grant amount.

Applications are limited to one application per Australian Business Number (ABN) for the first round of the program.

Additional applications may be made for any subsequent rounds provided the total grant to that applicant does not exceed \$35,000.

The availability of grants is subject to funds being available. No grants will be offered beyond the allocated funding. You should visit the NSW Government Grants and Funding website on a regular basis for the latest information regarding the close date.

Objectives

To assist primary producers to make data-led decisions to boost productivity, increase their market competitiveness and improve sustainable use of resources, including water efficiency, drought preparedness and resilience to climate change.

Eligibility criteria

Eligible applicants

Applicants must meet all the following criteria:

- have a primary production enterprise in any agricultural industry (see Definitions for the list of eligible ANSZIC Codes), however the program focus is on the livestock (beef and sheep), cotton, grains or horticulture (trees crops and vines) sectors
- operate the primary production enterprise in an eligible local government area: Armidale, Ballina, Byron, Cabonne, Carrathool, Griffith, Leeton, Lismore, Moree Plains, Narrabri, Orange
- hold an active ABN in respect of the primary production enterprise
- operate the primary production enterprise as a sole trader, partnership, trust or private company, or a combination of these structures
- obtain a turnover of at least \$40,000 per annum from primary production or otherwise operate an ATO recognised bona fide primary production enterprise
- the applicant or an authorised representative of the applicant
 - o must attend the FoTF Training Program by the 30 June 2023 or
 - must have enrolled in the online FoTF Training Program in Canvas by 30 June 2023 and complete the training by 31 July 2023
- receive a FoTF Training Program Certificate of Completion
- agree to provide DPI with access to weather data from specified complying Ag IoT devices purchased under the program to assist with seasonal conditions reporting and provision of future farm-level forecasting tools
- lodge an application by the closing date shown on the NSW Government Grants and Funding website.

Eligible purchases

These are purchases of Approved Agtech that are identified in your endorsed Agtech Plan from the approved suppliers in the FoTF Agtech Catalogue which fit the agriculture sectors and use cases defined by the FoTF Program.

Applicants are accountable for implementing the entire phase of project delivery including obtaining, where relevant, all planning permits, licences and approvals and appointing suppliers and/or contractors to complete works, including power requirements.

Successful applicants should ensure that installation and set-up of their Agtech equipment complies with the manufacturers' instructions, any relevant legislation and regulations, including, but not limited to the *Telecommunications Act* 1997 and the *Radiocommunications Act* 1992 and meets any applicable Australian Standards.

Ineligible purchases

The following are ineligible for grants under this program, and not will be paid:

- Ag IoT devices, connectivity solutions or dashboards that are already covered by NSW Government grant funding or under an insurance policy.
- Ag IoT devices, connectivity solutions or dashboards purchased prior to the applicant obtaining a FoTF Training Program Certificate of Completion; and
- Any purchases of Ag IoT devices, connectivity solutions, or dashboards that do not comply with the Agtech Catalogue at the time of approval.

Application process

Checklist for when you apply

The following documents are required to be summited upon application, prior to the closing date:

- Latest farm business tax returns and financial statements
- Local Government Area (council) rates notice or current lease agreement
- FoTF Training Program Certificate of Completion (see Definitions)
- Tech List (see Definitions)
- Agreement to full Terms and Conditions

If you have all documentation ready, the application should take approximately 30 minutes for you to complete. We need your documents to make sure this grant only goes to genuine eligible primary producers.

Applicants should refer to the NSW Government Grants and Funding website for information, to complete an online application and to make eligible claims.

Application close dates and invoice claim close dates are shown on the NSW Government Grants and Funding website.

- By submitting an application form, the applicant declares that the information provided in the application form and supporting documentation is true and accurate.
- If you are applying as an authorised representative for an applicant, a third-party authorisation form will need to be completed by the applicant. A recent bank statement or bank statement header with the BSB, Account Number and Account Name for the bank account listed on the application will also be required.
- Grants will only be approved while funding is still available.
- An approved application guarantees an applicant will receive payment of the grant if a claim is submitted before the closure of the claim period.

• If you believe your application has been unfairly denied or incorrectly processed, you can lodge an appeal through the RAA appeals process.

Making a Claim

- Successful applicants may submit claims anytime between the approval of the application and the closing of the claim period for eligible purchases they have made.
- To claim the grant, complete the claim form on the RAA website and provide the following:
 - \circ $\,$ valid tax invoices dated on or after the date on your FoTF Training Program Certificate of Completion
 - evidence you have purchased the Approved Agtech set out in your Agtech Plan from the Agtech Catalogue (e.g. \$0 balance tax invoices or a copy of a bank statement with proof of payment)
 - evidence the Approved Agtech have been installed at your primary industry enterprise and are ready for use (e.g. photographic evidence). The Department and the RAA may require further information before paying a claim, including without limitation:
 - explanation of inconsistencies between the approved application and the submitted invoices
 - proof of installation
 - an onsite audit

Assessment

- Applications will be assessed in order of receipt by the FoTF program. Incomplete applications will not enter the assessment queue or be assessed until all required information is provided. Late applications will not be accepted.
- Applications will be assessed against the eligibility criteria.
- The Department will make an initial assessment of eligibility, based on your completion of the FoTF Training Program and provision of an endorsed Agtech Plan.
- Applications that pass this stage will be referred to the RAA for final assessment of eligibility (including Primary Producer status), approval and processing.

- The RAA will not approve an application from a person, or a close associate of a person, who is under investigation or has been charged in relation to the fraudulent receipt of grants under this program or other programs.
- The RAA reserves the right to request further information from you or from any business or individual you have engaged, to assist in assessing your application and to verify any information provided in your application. Failure to provide such information may result in the RAA refusing your application.
- The RAA reserves the right to refuse an application where eligibility criteria are not met, or where you do not or cannot provide sufficient information for the RAA to determine if eligibility criteria have been met.
- Applicants should note that past financial assistance under this program or any other program is not a reliable indicator of eligibility for future financial assistance under this program.
- Applications submitted may be subject to audit by the RAA or its agents in order to determine compliance with scheme guidelines.
- Before applying for financial assistance under this program, you should seek advice from your legal, business or financial advisers about the tax implications of this financial assistance.
- You will be required to provide a range of supporting documentation that may include the latest local government area (council) rate notice, tax returns and financial statements for the applying entity.
- Applications will be assessed and notified within 20 business days of an applicant's submission. Where complex applications are received this timeframe may be up to 30 days.
- Details of successful applicants will be supplied to the Director Regional Digital Connectivity on the same day that the applicant is notified. The responsible Minister's office will be notified of successful applications on a monthly basis.
- Claim processing timeframes will be within 15 business days of the RAA and FoTF receiving a claim. Where complex applications are received this timeframe may be up to 20 business days.

Terms and conditions

Important information

- The FoTF Program and the RAA reserve the right to amend, alter or change these guidelines at any time, and it is your responsibility to check the relevant website prior to application.
- The Department has selected suppliers for the Agtech Catalogue (available on the FoTF website) using an open assessment process. All product information in the Catalogue is provided by suppliers who were selected under an open Expression of Interest tender. DRNSW has not tested the products listed in the Catalogue, nor has it independently confirmed that the products comply with applicable standards and regulations.
- Supplier pricing stated in the Agtech Catalogue is subject to change and is indicative only. Contact suppliers for current pricing.
- DPI, the Department of Regional NSW and the NSW Government make no warranties and expressly disclaim, to the extent permitted by law, any warranty or legal liability in relation to:
 - the accuracy, reliability, currency or completeness of any information provided in the Catalogue or any statements or representations by suppliers;
 - the financial or regulatory status of any suppliers listed in the Catalogue or their qualifications or legal compliance; or

- the quality, serviceability, fitness for purpose or regulatory compliance of any products listed in the Catalogue.
- The Department is not responsible for the installation, performance or ongoing management of the network, devices or dashboards. All issues and legislative compliance concerning the supply, installation, maintenance and performance of such devices and connectivity are governed by the agreements between the supplier and purchaser, whether or not the purchaser has applied for or received a grant under this program.
- You agree to allow DPI to access climate data (rainfall, radiation temperature and near surface wind speed) from devices purchased under the program. DPI will use this data in a trial to improve state-wide drought monitoring and forecasting, as part of its Seasonal Conditions reporting services. At the end of the trial on 30th June 2025 the data will not be retained and further use of data and or sensor feeds will require a separate agreement to be formed between DPI and landholders. Arrangements for data sharing will be made with your chosen supplier if you agree to share it for this purpose. No personal information or information which could be used to identify individual properties will be published.
- The final decision maker is the Secretary DRNSW.
- Without limiting its rights, the RAA in its sole discretion may recover funds from the applicant, and determine that a debt is due, if evidence indicates that the applicant:
 - o did not meet the eligibility criteria
 - received an over-payment of the grant (whether of the up-front grant or of an additional grant payment)
 - o spent any part of the grant on costs that were not eligible purchases items or activities.

Fraudulent claims

- The RAA takes fraud and corruption seriously. Suspected fraud will be assessed and investigated as appropriate, which may require the involvement of external parties such as the NSW Police Force or the NSW Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC).
- By signing the claim form you are declaring that the information provided in the application form and supporting documentation is true and accurate.
- Providing inaccurate, untrue or misleading information may be a breach of the *Rural Assistance Act 1989* or criminal law for which serious penalties may apply.
- The RAA responds to fraud by:
 - \circ $\;$ audit and site validation of applications and claims that are of concern
 - \circ $\;$ referral to the NSW Police Force or the ICAC of suspected fraud
 - o recovery of any assistance provided under a fraudulent application
- An application approval, or payment of a claim against an approved grant, may be delayed where:
 - \circ $\,$ assistance previously provided by this or any other related NSW Government grant program cannot be validated or
 - \circ $\,$ the outcome of relevant legal or validation actions may impact the decision to grant further assistance.
- If the applicant has received a payment under this program and the Department is satisfied that the eligibility conditions were or have been contravened, the payment or part of the payment may be recovered by the Crown in a court of competent jurisdiction as debt due to the Crown, pursuant to section 5.7(3) of the *Government Sector Finance Act 2018*.

• Invoices submitted in relation to this application must not be used to secure grant funding under any other NSW Government scheme.

Evaluation

- Participants will be required to take part in DPI's post-trial performance monitoring and evaluation activities, including surveys and case studies.
- The RAA is receiving applications and distributing approved funding on behalf of the FoTF Program. The RAA is committed to providing excellent service that responds to your needs and for that reason, the RAA evaluates its programs. This includes surveys at various points of your application, approval and completion. The RAA may also contact you to ask about your experience of the assistance you received. The RAA will always treat the responses you provide as confidential and use the information only for the purposes it was collected.

Government Information (Public Access) Act

Applicants should be aware information submitted in applications and all related correspondence, attachments and other documents may be made publicly available under the *Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009* (NSW). Information that is deemed to be commercially sensitive will be withheld.

The *Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009* makes government information accessible to the public by:

- requiring government agencies to make certain sorts of information freely available
- encouraging government agencies to release as much other information as possible
- giving the public an enforceable right to make access applications for government information
- restricting access to information only when there is an overriding public interest against disclosure

Definitions

Ag loT device means any device sold for use in agriculture that has a sensor attached to or embedded within it to enable the measurement and transmission of data over a communications network.

Agtech Catalogue means an online catalogue of information on Ag IoT devices, connectivity solutions and device data integration platforms which DPI will develop for use by producers in NSW wishing to develop their farm productivity through on-farm connectivity and related technology.

Agtech Plan is the combination of the Monitoring Plan and the Tech List.

Approved Agtech means Ag IoT devices, connectivity solutions and device data integration dashboards that have been deemed suitable by the Department to be included in the Agtech Catalogue.

Authorised representative A representative nominated by the eligible applicant.

ANZSIC codes – Eligible primary production enterprises (ANZSIC codes):

FoTF Training Program Certificate of Completion is issued when the applicant or authorised representative has completed the FoTF training program in full.

loT The Internet of Things (IoT) refers to the collective network of connected devices and the technology that facilitates communication between devices, the cloud, as well as the devices themselves. The Internet of Things integrates everyday 'things' with the internet.

Monitoring Plan is a plan that outlines what is going to be monitored across the primary production enterprise. A product of the FoTF training program, it will encompass operational pain points, farm mapping, a landscape assessment and connectivity availability. It will act as a tool to assist in the selection of on-farm Agtech devices and the creation of an Agtech Plan which can be used as part of a whole farm plan or support a grant application.

Primary production enterprise:

- is carried on by a primary producer and involves primary production, as defined by the ANZSIC Codes approved for this program
- is registered for tax purposes in Australia with an Australian Business Number (ABN); and
- is not a public company under the meaning of the Corporations Act 2001 (Cth).
- is in the opinion of the RAA is a bona fide primary production enterprise that:
 - o has a significant commercial purpose or character
 - o has more than a mere intention to engage in primary production
 - has an intention to make a profit or a genuine belief that a profit will be made
 - o has repetition and regularity in the activity
 - is the same kind and carried on in a similar way to that of similar primary production enterprises
 - is organised in a business-like manner.

Supplier means an organisation that has been pre-selected by DPI as being qualified to supply devices under the FoTF Agtech Catalogue.

Tech List is a list of Agtech devices, connectivity solutions and integration products from the Agtech Catalogue that will fulfill the monitoring needs outlined in the monitoring plan.

- *Third Party Authorisation* is a document that has been signed by the applicant agreeing that an authorised representative may discuss and obtain information about them.
- Valid tax invoice means a paid invoice including the name, address and ABN (if applicable) of the entity that issued the invoice and a description of each item to which the invoice relates which is clearly identifiable as being related to approved expenditure for the applicant. The RAA can ask for proof of payment of the invoice or a \$0 balance.
